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LESSON ONE

BEHOLD, YOUR SON

LUKE 23 AND JOHN 19 – JESUS, MY EXAMPLE

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INTRODUCTION

Jesus was crucified. His body was racked with pain. He was struggling to breathe. His mouth was parched and dry. His blood-crusted body hung exposed for the world to see. But, in spite of everything He was enduring, Jesus had some unfinished business. Listen to what He says as He undergoes unimaginable torture. “Father, forgive them!” “Today you will be with Me.” “Mother, behold your son.” Jesus had told His disciples that they had seen the Father because they had seen Him (John 14:9). Consider these words of Jesus and discover the essence of His Father. So the phrase goes, “Like father, like son.”

Years before Jesus had invited twelve men to follow Him and promised to make them fishers of men. Even on the cross He taught them by giving them an example. Through Peter’s epistle (1 Peter 2) we hear His invitation and are encouraged by Peter to follow in His steps even enduring hardships and persecution. The One we are to follow asks nothing more of us than what He Himself has endured. Learn what drove Jesus to persevere through it all.

Treasure everything Jesus bore for you through His passion and death. Give thanks to Him with a grateful heart for He became the innocent criminal bearing our shame. This was the will of God that “for our sake He made Him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God.”

LESSON 1

Part 1

INTRODUCTION: Jesus was on the cross from nine in the morning (the third hour -- Mark 15:25) until three in the afternoon (the ninth hour – Mark 15:34). The Gospel writers recorded seven times Jesus spoke while hanging on the cross. We will briefly look at these sentences that Jesus spoke. Once again, you are encouraged to come close to the cross. Jesus is weak and near death. His words may be difficult to hear but you don't want to miss anything He says.

ASSIGNMENT: Reread Luke 23:34a. Again, what does Jesus say? _____

EXERCISE:

1. Luke records the first words Jesus spoke immediately after He had the iron spikes driven into His hands (most likely, into His wrist bones) and feet. The cross had been dropped into the placement hole which jarred His traumatized body and raked His severely torn flesh. And, the first words out of Jesus' mouth are, "Father, _____ them."
 2. History teaches that in utter humiliation those crucified hung on the cross naked and exposed for all to see. We can imagine this was true for Jesus because we read that the soldiers nearby were busy dividing up His clothes by casting lots (verse 34b). Jesus had nothing left. He was literally stripped of everything yet He prayed for His enemies, "Father, _____ them for they _____ not what they _____." What were they doing? _____

Jesus asked His Father to *forgive* those who had just crucified His One and only Son.

REFLECTION: As we reflect it would be very easy to ask ourselves the question, "What would I have done?" But is this the question to ask? One can't help but sit in silence and reflect on what Jesus did. Jesus committed no sin. Jesus did not deceive His followers, Pilate, or anyone else for that matter. He was who He said He was. Jesus didn't retaliate or make threats when everyone was hurling their insults at Him. But Jesus did "entrust Himself to Him who judges justly (1 Peter 2:22-23)." Your thoughts:

Part 3

INTRODUCTION: Jesus has prayed for His enemies and now Luke privileges us by letting us eavesdrop on a private conversation between Jesus and one of the criminals. In the beginning both

criminals “heaped insults on Him (Matthew 27:44).” Now in Luke 23:40 we hear one of the men rebuking the other, shouting past Jesus to him. Listen closely...

ASSIGNMENT: Read Luke 23:41-43.

REFLECTION: One criminal has just told the other, “We are punished justly, for we are getting what our deeds deserve.” This man confessed his guilt. He admits that he has done wrong. He does deserve his punishment, even death. He has recognized his need for forgiveness. And to Jesus he says, “Remember me...” Forgive me.

APPLICATION: What about me? Which criminal do I seem to identify with—the one who continued to hurl insults at Jesus believing it was His fault that he was still hanging on this cross, or the one who asked Jesus to remember him because he needed a Savior? _____

REFLECTION: The one criminal has just told the other, “But this man has done nothing wrong.” Again Jesus’ innocence of any wrongdoing is recognized. Pilate found no fault in Jesus and neither does this criminal. He is innocent!

APPLICATION:

1. Am I eager to recognize Jesus’ innocence and profess His innocence to others? Do I want to blame Him for things that happen in my life as though He was guilty of some wrongdoing?

2. How does my life reflect what I believe to be true about Him? _____

REFLECTION:

1. And then, the repentant criminal makes a profound statement. He says, “Remember me when you come into *Your kingdom*.” This man had his eyes wide open for he recognized Jesus to be a King. He had heard the insults and those who mocked Jesus as the King of the Jews, the King of Israel. The inscription over Jesus’ head read: “Jesus of Nazareth, The King of the Jews (John 19:19).” In spite of everyone’s insults and mockery this man declared Jesus to be King.
2. And Jesus willingly forgives this criminal who has declared Jesus to be the Son of God, the King of Israel, the King of the Jews. For Jesus this is what gives glory to His Father, who would have

all come to know the Him through His Son, who would have all be saved and come to a knowledge of the truth (1 Timothy 2:4).

APPLICATION: Yes, Jesus is the King of Israel. Jesus wants to be my King. Like this man do I recognize and acknowledge Jesus' innocence? Do I ask Him to remember and forgive me? Do I acknowledge His kingship and declare Jesus to be the Lord of my life? Above all, can I hear Jesus say to me, "Today you will be with Me in paradise"? _____

PRAYER: Write your own prayer reflection on the words of Jesus to the criminal, "Today you will be with Me in Paradise." _____

ASSIGNMENT: Read John 19:25-27. John is the only Gospel writer who tells us about these words. The words are for those dearest to Jesus, His mother and "the disciple whom Jesus loved (John 13:23)," namely John.

REFLECTION:

1. Jesus is very near death. He is enduring excruciating pain. And then He sees His mother who quite possibly was standing very near to her dying Son. Jesus noticed that John was standing nearby. Our heart goes out to Mary. A mother would want to tenderly cradle the head of her dying son and stroke his blood encrusted face. A mother would want to soothe his flogged body

and take within herself her son's pain and torment. But Jesus is hanging there on the cross. Mary suffered deep anguish. Simeon in Luke 2:35 told Mary when she and Joseph presented Jesus at the temple that _____

Looking compassionately on them He set aside His own circumstance in order to minister to them with love by granting each to the other. Again, He gives us an example that we should follow in His steps (1 Peter 2:21).

QUESTION: What would my life look like if I showed compassion to others by setting aside my circumstances to care for others? _____

PRAYER: Compassion is a characteristic of Jesus, God's only Son. Ask the Lord to empower you with compassion. Ask Him to develop within you a heart of compassion for others. Ask Him to enable you to set yourself aside for others in their moment of need. _____

LESSON TWO

MY GOD, MY GOD

READINGS FROM THE FOUR GOSPELS - FORSAKEN

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INTRODUCTION

No suffering was greater for Jesus than the complete abandonment of His Father. God's wrath was ultimately being poured out on His Son when Jesus cried out, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken Me?" These words provide a new depth of understanding and appreciation for God's words to the Israelites in Deuteronomy, "I will never leave you nor forsake you" and the words of Jesus to His disciples before ascending into heaven, "I am with you always, to the end of the age." What Jesus endured, He did for me! Because He did I will never be separated from the love of God which is mine in Christ Jesus (Romans 8:38-39).

Three more hours on the cross... It's been quiet. The crowd of onlookers has started to disburse. People are making their way into Jerusalem for the Passover and those passing by the crucifixion sight cast their eyes on another notorious criminal, the spotless Lamb of God, breathing His last breaths.

Listen carefully. If you are traveling by, stop for a moment. He's asking for water. It seems as though He has something He wants to say...

LESSON 2

Part 1

INTRODUCTION: We are told in Mark 15:33 that around noon, the _____ hour, that there was darkness over the whole _____. This darkness lasted until the _____ hour, or three o'clock. 1. Now it was the ninth hour. Jesus is experiencing our sins just reward, the absence of God. He is making the full payment for sin. He is going through hell for us. God the Father has forsaken Him, deserted and abandoned Him.
2. We have never been totally forsaken. Throughout the Bible there are passages reassuring us that He will never leave us nor forsake us. What does God tell us in these references?

3. Life can get very difficult. For example, some may speak of marriage as "a living hell." Others may speak of life as "going through hell." Experiences that take life can be gruesome and the question gets asked, "Where was God in all of this?" The suffering some endure can be completely unjust. Sin is the only explanation for life's brutality. Your thoughts: _____

4. What Jesus was experiencing on the cross is difficult to comprehend for He was experiencing the wrath of God on sin. Jesus took upon Himself the sin of the whole world. No one could endure it for Him. No one could help Him as He suffered and died. No one could take His place. He alone had to bear it all for us. We can think that to be forsaken means that God didn't answer our prayers as we begged Him to do. We can think that to be forsaken of God means that our loved ones shouldn't die until we say so, and if they do die, we think God has abandoned us. We can

think that to be forsaken of God means we didn't get the job or the raise, the conception of a child, or the health we expected. When Jesus cries out, He cries out as one forsaken by the love of the Father and now endures His wrath, His anger over sin. His suffering and death are because of sin and the devil. Because sin permeated all of creation including you and me, all of creation had to die.

5. You may recall from the study *God's Plan, Our Choice*, the study of Genesis 1-11, that the devil deceived Adam and Eve into rebellion against God and His Word. This rebellion broke the relationship between God and us which we were incapable of reestablishing. This could only be accomplished by God's power. We deserved suffering and death but He wanted life and salvation for us. The work of Jesus is the act of taking into Himself what we deserved. Instead of our death God sent His Son Jesus to die for us in our place. The following passage articulates this well: "The wages of sin is _____, but the _____ of God is eternal life in _____ our _____ (Romans 6:23)."

6. It's interesting to note that nothing more is said about the chief priests and their officials. Did they leave the site of the crucifixion? Had they done what they set out to do? Did they think that once Jesus was crucified and they had finished hurling their insults at Him that they could leave? After all, His death could take hours, even days. The only place that we hear about them again is when they complained to Pilate about what he had written on the notice that was fastened to the cross. The note informed the people of Jesus' criminal charges. It read, "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews." What did the protesters insist that Pilate write (John 19:21) instead? _____

The Jewish officials wanted to distort the truth but by now Pilate must have had enough. He was probably disgusted with himself and His failure to act with power and authority at Jesus' trial.

What was Pilate's answer in response to their demand (verse 22)? _____

Part 2

INTRODUCTION: It was the ninth hour. Jesus was about to hand over His Spirit to His Father. His work was done but Jesus had something to say before He died.

ASSIGNMENT: Read John 19:28-30.

Jesus wanted everyone to hear Him say to them, "*Tetelestai!*"—not just the women, not just those gathered around the cross, not just the soldiers, but Pilate, Annas and Caiaphas, the chief priests and Jewish rulers. He wanted His disciples to hear wherever they were and the Samaritans and Gentiles everywhere. He wanted those far and near, throughout the world to hear, "*Tetelestai!*" And, He wanted you and me, our neighbors and friends, our coworkers and governments to hear Him say, "*Tetelestai!*"
5. And at that next moment we hear Him say (Luke 23:46), " _____

6. Jesus had been handed over to Herod, then to Pilate, the crowd and others. Now He hands Himself over to His Father with the words, "Into Your _____ I commit my spirit." And Jesus breathed His last. He bowed His head and gave up His spirit. The Gospel writers were careful not to say that Jesus died as though He was a victim of sin, death, and the devil. Rather Jesus wanted us to understand that He entrusted Himself, His spirit and all that He was, to Him who judges justly (1 Peter 2:23b). Again, "Father, into Your _____ I _____ My spirit."

LESSON THREE

GO AND TELL!

READINGS FROM THE FOUR GOSPELS – HE IS RISEN!

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INTRODUCTION

The agony of the cross has ended. Passover has ended. It was the first day of the week. The guards were on duty keeping watch over the tomb. The man who called himself the King of the Jews was dead. All the hype of the last couple of days was finally over. It was quiet in Jerusalem once again. Or, so it seemed. At least that's what Pilate, Caiaphas, Annas, and the elders thought. The one who caused such disturbances among the people was no more.

LESSON 3

Part 1

REFLECTION (continued):

4. The angel sat on the stone. Some fun thoughts might cross your mind when you consider this. The angel must have anticipated visitors coming to the tomb. He held the best news ever and must have been so excited and felt so privileged to announce to the world that Jesus had risen just as He said He would. One wonders if the angel smiled as the guards shook and fell to the ground like dead men. Weren't these the men who were sent to secure the tomb from robbers, namely Jesus' disciples? A violent shake, the angel appeared, the stone rolled away and they are powerless to guard and hold anything secure while lying on the ground as though dead. The tomb was open, exposed, empty, and on display ready for visitors!
5. The first words of the angel to the women were, “_____.” He knew that the women came looking for the dead body of their crucified Lord. After all, that's all they had been thinking about since they saw Him placed in the tomb by Joseph and Nicodemus. Now they encounter a dazzling light, clothes as white as snow, and a voice that says, “Do not be afraid.” And then the angel goes on to say that the body they are looking for is not here. What

would be your immediate reaction? Maybe it would be, “Well then, who took it?” The angel tells them the Good News: “He is not here; He has risen, just as He said.”

6. The angel didn't leave the women standing outside but invited them to come in and see the place where he lay. And then he gave the women a directive. What were they to do (verse 7)?

7. What was the message for the disciples? _____

Although the disciples were not the first to the tomb, the concern was that they knew of Jesus' resurrection from the dead. “Go quickly and tell His disciples.” There was an urgency that they find out this Good News!

8. So the women hurried off with this mix of emotions. Although they remained somewhat afraid, their joy compelled them to run and tell the disciples. And on the way, who did they meet but the risen Lord Jesus Himself. They took hold of His feet. They needed to touch Him to know that He was not a ghost but had flesh and blood. And then they responded like all those who have experienced the risen Lord in their lives. They worshipped Him! Jesus reiterated what they heard the angel say, “Do not be afraid.” And the directive was the same, “Go and tell my brothers...” Jesus confirmed what they were told by the angel, what they observed in the tomb, and now what they saw with their own eyes and touched with their own hands. Jesus was alive and risen from the dead!

c. Christ’s resurrection also proves that we have a Living God as Jesus had said, “He is not the God of the dead but of the living (Matthew 22:32).” All other religions of the world believe that God is either an almighty but unapproachable force, “divine power,” or God is only a philosophy—thus, a dead god. As a Christian, Christ’s resurrection validates God as an intimate, loving God who desires a personal relationship with every human being—thus, the Living God. He offers to you and me a close intimate and loving relationship with Him.

d. There is even more Good News. God made me alive having invited me to participate with Jesus in His death and resurrection. He *ignites* me with His power as He lives in me and works through me. The command of the angel was to go quickly and tell. The

command of Jesus was to go and tell. The command has not changed. I am to go quickly and tell others that He has risen from the dead! His Word is true. He is who He said He is. He has told us the truth. He invites me into His mission to tell everyone what He has done. He invites me and empowers me thus igniting His Word with power and might. After all, John 10:10 tells us that He came in order that we may have _____ and have it to the _____.

LESSON FOUR

AND THEIR EYES WERE OPENED

MATTHEW 28 AND LUKE 24 – RESURRECTION DAY

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INTRODUCTION

What a day for Jesus' disciples and the women who cared for them! It started with an earthquake early in the morning and ended with the men returning from Emmaus to report that they had been with Jesus. So much excitement and consternation mixed with their fear of the Jews kept them confined behind locked doors. One moment He's dead and the next He's alive. One moment there's a missing body and the next minute Jesus appears as their Living Lord. One moment they are told to "come and see" and the next moment they are told to "go and tell."

And meanwhile, the chief priests and elders are dealing with guards who reported that an earthquake caused the stone to be rolled away from the tomb and now the dead man's body is missing. What were they going to do with that report?

Eyes were being opened all day long. The guards, chief priests and elders, the women, Peter and John and all the other disciples and followers were beginning to see Truth revealed as never before. As you study become aware of the condition of the eyes of your own heart. Let God's Spirit reveal to you your risen Lord and Savior.

LESSON 4

You have heard the story from the women. You know what happened early that morning. Are you running, filled with joy, to tell others? Who do you want to tell? Who does Jesus want to know that He is their Living Lord? _____

PRAYER: O Lord, You are my Living Lord. Your body was raised from the dead. The angel said, “He is not here. He is risen just as He said.” The grave clothes were left behind. No longer do I need to live in fear; I am released to go and tell others. Give me the courage to tell others that none of us need fear death or the grave any longer. Just as You were raised from the dead, so shall all of us be raised. What joy and comfort I have knowing that my Redeemer lives. _____

Part 2

INTRODUCTION: Needless to say, this first day of the week was different than any other and never again would there be another one like it. The range of emotions kept everything in commotion. First, the

grief of knowing that Jesus was dead brought the women to the tomb (Mark 16:1). Then the fear that His body had been taken brought Peter and John running to the tomb (John 20:3-8). Jesus' appearance to the women brought confidence (Matthew 28:10) to go and tell the disciples what they had seen and heard. TEACHING: Jesus, the Resurrected Lord, comes and brings four gifts to His people, to His sent ones, to you and me. These gifts are all mentioned in these three verses, John 20:21-23.

1. Jesus brings the gift of His *peace*.

What gift could these people need more than peace? They were experiencing anything but peace. Their leader had been executed. One of their friends not only betrayed their leader but then committed suicide. They had never seen such violence and hatred from their religious leaders. Their dream of Israel's release from the oppression of the Romans was squelched. Their expectations shattered. They all might have thought that He would come down from the cross and save Himself and them but He died and left them with fear for their own lives.

What had been going on behind locked doors? Did they talk about what went wrong, how everything happened so fast, how He had warned them? Did they recall what He had said? Did they admit to themselves and one another that they didn't believe it was possible? Did they admit that they didn't want to believe He would really die? Were they feeling guilty for abandoning and deserting Jesus just as He said they would? Now they were overwhelmed with fear of the Jews. When would they come after them? Everyone knew they were His followers.

Were they experiencing the reality of their own powerlessness? They had no power over their leader. At this moment they had no idea where He was. They had no power over their circumstances and no power over death. They didn't even have power over responses to their fear and had no power over their future. They were powerless! With this upheaval of emotions, insecurity and fear they longed for the gift of peace! Your thoughts: _____

Peace is ours. It heals our relationship with God and restores our relationship with our fellow human beings. Peace reconciles us to the Father through the blood of Jesus Christ shed on the cross. Peace is God's gift to those who believe that He is the Savior of the world. Peace enables us to hear God's plan and hear His invitation to us to join Him as He seeks to reach out and save those who are lost and don't know His love. Peace enables us to breathe deep and receive His power through the Spirit who empowers me and all believers to participate in His purpose of bringing forgiveness, hope, and new life to all through the message of Jesus, our Resurrected Lord! 4. Jesus brings the gift of His *purpose*.

Jesus’ purpose for sending us with the life giving breath of His Spirit is that through our lives others might receive the forgiveness of sins. Forgiveness is the exchange for sin. Jesus forgave us and took our sin upon Himself. God’s love initiates God’s purpose. God did not love us because Jesus died for us. No, Jesus died for us because God loved us. John 3:16 reminds us that God loved us and gave His Son. God gave Jesus to save us, not to condemn us (John 3:17).

People everywhere seek purpose and meaning in their lives. They ask, “What is my purpose in life?” This is a universal question. We long for a purpose larger than “eating, drinking, and being merry.” We want to live a life that matters. In this story, Jesus links His purpose to our purpose. Just as the Father sent Him to bring love, forgiveness and peace to the world so Jesus now gives us the same purpose. Whether in my home or work, exercise room or neighborhood I can be a person who forgives, loves, and brings peace. This is a great purpose! This gives meaning to life. This has *eternal* value.

DO YOU LOVE ME?

JOHN 21:1-19 – FOLLOW ME

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INTRODUCTION

The disciples had gone up to Galilee as Jesus had instructed them. One gets a sense that these men were bored. In John 21 they decided to go fishing. What happened? Discover an analogy between their catch of fish and the work of God's people, the Church. What might the catch of fish communicate to them regarding their ministry as fishers of men?

We may ask the question, "Can God use me?" But often we may really want to know, "Can I do something so bad that God cannot and will not use me?" Peter had done what he never thought possible when he denied his Lord. We were told that in remorse he went out and wept bitterly. Forgiveness was immediate. God never withholds forgiveness. Jesus, however, knew there was another issue that needed to be resolved. In Lesson 6 take a moment and sit quietly by Jesus and listen to his conversation with Peter. Maybe Jesus is answering your question as well

LESSON 6

Part 3

But, the unresolved question remained, "Jesus, can I sin so badly that you will refuse to use me?"

GO INTO ALL THE WORLD

MARK 16 – JESUS’ COMMAND

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INTRODUCTION

So, where is Jesus now? He seems to have just disappeared behind a cloud. He said He would never leave us nor forsake us. Then where is he? In a way, we may feel a little like the disciples looking up in the clouds wondering what happened to their Victorious Leader. Where did He go?

Lesson 7 concludes the study of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, the Savior of the world. All biblical history pointed toward this one moment in time. The Old Testament looks forward to the coming of the Messiah, the Anointed One, the Christ who was promised by God to be the Redeemer. The New Testament believers look back to the cross and the empty tomb for in Jesus' death and resurrection we have all that we need for this life and the next. We have a Savior who did it all. He did for us what we were not able to do for ourselves. He redeemed us with His precious body and blood, sacrificed for the forgiveness of our sins.

LESSON 7

Part 5

INTRODUCTION: Sometimes the timeline of events gets a little fuzzy. It's difficult to know exactly when things happened and in what order they occurred. Several times after the resurrection Jesus gave the instruction that His disciples were to go to Galilee and there they would see Him (Matthew 28:7, 10). It's difficult to know when Jesus met them there. We do know that there were 40 days from the resurrection until His ascension into heaven so it could have happened during those days. Another uncertainty is if He ascended from the mountain referred to in Galilee (Matthew 28:16) or if He ascended somewhere outside of Bethany which was in Judea. Certainly where and when He ascended is not the crucial point. The words of Jesus to His disciples, however, provide the same teaching for us today as it did for them so many years ago. The words of Jesus to the Eleven recorded in Matthew 28:18-20 have been the marching orders of God's people throughout the history of time.

In John 3 we are reminded that God acted out of His love for all humankind. His desire was and continues to be that the whole world is saved from sin, death, and the devil. God the Father acted by giving that which was most precious to Him, His one and only Son. He gave in order that all who believed in His Son as their Savior would be saved and given eternal life. God the Father did not send Jesus for the purpose of condemning the world but to save it!

2. Ephesians 2:8-9 _____

St. Paul wrote these words to the church in Ephesus and these same words are said for us to hear today. We are saved by grace, by God's love for us that can never be earned or worked for or deserved. We are saved by His gift of grace to us, His gift of love. His love is a free gift that can never be attained by anything we do. It is a gift that can only be received through faith in the redeeming work of Jesus. To us God says that His Son has done it all. *Tetelestai!*

3. Matthew 28:19-20 _____

In Matthew 28 Jesus tells us that all authority is His. It has been given to Him by His Father. Now He says to His disciples, to us and to those who come after us, "Go and make disciples of all nations! This is His invitation to us to join Him in His mission to make disciples, to baptize in His Name, and to teach obedience to His Word. Above all, He gives His promise to always be

with us, to the very end of the age. With these words we know that we are privileged for we belong to His Kingdom and are His children. With these words we know that the privilege holds a responsibility, the responsibility to be His messengers of such Good News for all humankind. With these words we are given the assignment, the assignment to teach others all that we ourselves have been taught whether much or little. With these words we have the promise, the promise of His presence which grants to us His peace which passes all understanding.

MEMORIZATION: You probably have already guessed what will be your challenge for memory work. The desire is that these three passages be so etched in your memory that you might be reassured of your own salvation through faith in the work and words of the Lord. And, the desire is also that you might never have a dull moment in your life as you enthusiastically join God in His ongoing mission to all the world and with Him make disciples.

If you have not done so already, be sure to write out these verses on index cards and enjoy the challenge of not only the memory work but also following Jesus in obedience to His call: “Go, make disciples!”

You are familiar with the passion story, the story of Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection as told by the four Gospel writers: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Although Jesus knew that He would be betrayed, denied, flogged, mocked, and crucified, He remained obedient to the will of His Father. He knew that He was to accomplish the purpose for which He was sent. We followed Him from the Passover meal with His disciples to the Garden of Gethsemane where He wrestled in prayer.
